**Mumbi**- is derived from one of the <u>Kenyan</u> tribes called Kikuyu, which is also Joyce's dialect.

Mumbi is a name given to a lady, meaning "She who creates." (Pronounced Mombi).

**Mukisa** - is derived from Luganda, a dialect from <u>Uganda</u>. Meaning, Blessing.

**Desta** - is derived from Amharic in Ethiopia, which means happiness.
